Award honours brothers' generous spirit, NSCC connection

Attending NSCC was a positive experience for Colin and Ryan MacAskill, so after their untimely deaths, their parents, Fred and Sarita, established an award to help other young people access an education at Nova Scotia Community College.

"We felt very good about the experience they had there," says Sarita.

The Colin and Ryan MacAskill Memorial Award was initially established in honour of Ryan, a second-year NSCC Financial Services student at Kingstec Campus, who lost his life in an accident shortly before graduating in 2006. After the sudden passing of his older brother in 2013, the family decided to alter the award to include Colin, who graduated from the same Financial Services program in 2003 and then completed a Business Administration degree at Mount Saint Vincent University.

The bursary - available to a male and female student each year across various programs at Kingstec Campus in Kentville recognizes the brothers' personal generosity toward friends and family, and the value they each placed on receiving a college education.

Sarita notes that after Ryan's death, the campus invited his family to accept his

diploma at convocation, and planted a tree in his memory.

"The school was very caring and supportive and we were astounded by the generosity of people and businesses in this area," she says. "The award is really not about us - it's about being able to support students."

This academic year, The Colin and Ryan MacAskill Memorial Award went to Andrea Fritz, a Practical Nursing student, and William Saunders from the Heavy Duty Equipment / Truck & Transport Repair program.

Andrea, a single mother of a young son, has a Bachelor of Science degree and graduated from NSCC's Continuing Care program in 2011. She's been working at a nursing-care facility and enjoying it so much she decided to enroll in the Licensed Practical Nurse course with an eye to eventually becoming a Registered Nurse.

"I feel honored and I am so appreciative of the award – it is a huge help to me," says Andrea, who attended a luncheon meeting with the MacAskills after receiving the award.

"This program is going to take her to the next stage in her career," says Sarita. "It was so nice to meet her and hear about why she's chosen this field."

As one of 26 recipients of the Credit Union Education Award, Winnifred is "deeply appreciative" of the financial boost.

"In planning to come here, I realized I didn't have all of the money I needed, so I had to borrow. The financial help is so appreciated, because it is helping me offset some of those costs," she says.

A frequent volunteer, Winnifred is active on campus and in Davis Hall residence, where she lives. She and a fellow student even founded a new group called IDEAL (Internationally Diverse and Embracing All Lives).

And while exploring business ideas for herself, Winnifred has also helped her Mom expand her longstanding venture, taking her bammy product - a traditional Jamaican cassava flatbread - out of the local market and into grocery stores in Jamaica.

"Her experience has taught me that going into business requires energy and devotion and the ability to stick to your goals," she says.

Shannex-NSCC partnership a boost for students, health-care sector

A new partnership between Shannex Incorporated and Nova Scotia Community College will give students, the company and the health-care sector a major boost.

The Shannex Pathway to Success Bursary program will provide significant financial support - \$300,000 in total over three years - to eligible students enrolled in the Continuing Care course at NSCC.

Along with a \$2,000 award each to help cover tuition and related costs, recipients will be guaranteed a work placement with Shannex, and following graduation, one-year paid employment with the company. Shannex provides seniors' accommodation, service and care in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Ontario.

"Shannex is leading the way to better living for our aging population, so it's a privilege to work with them on this important and timely initiative," says Michelle Bussey, NSCC Foundation's Director, Development.

"Not only will this open doors for dedicated students in financial need, it will help address an industry gap in Nova Scotia, ensuring citizens in need receive the excellent care they deserve."
