The connections between Halifax Water and NSCC run deep. That was clear at a recent NSCC Alumni @work event, which surfaced more than 75 alumni who work at the utility.

The NSCC Alumni @work event series celebrates industry partners and alumni cohorts in their workplace while sharing the benefits of the NSCC alumni program.

"We're here to celebrate our relationship with NSCC and the work we do together. The College trains great minds, and we put those minds to work," said Halifax Water General Manager Carl Yates.

Halifax Water provides work placements and generous bursaries for students, while their employees serve on College committees developing curriculum. Meanwhile, NSCC provides professional

development and training opportunities for Halifax Water employees.

"It's a great way to build community, and a great way to build careers," said Carl, who in 2008 spearheaded the utility's bursary fund at NSCC. The fund has now awarded over \$100,000 in financial aid to students, many of them from underrepresented groups.

Tavanney Thorpe, A Civil Engineering Technology student who received the Halifax Water Achievement Award, said the support has been "a tremendous benefit. It is with gratitude that I stand here today."

"You have a great work environment here, and I want to thank Carl and your entire team for being such a great employer for our graduates," said Don Bureaux, NSCC President. He said Yates will be greatly missed when he retires this summer after 31 years with Halifax Water.

Robert held several positions at the College, including Academic Chair for the School of Trades and Technology. He was passionate about working with and supporting learners who might not otherwise have had an opportunity for post-secondary education.

That commitment resonates with Dylan, a

hockey and baseball player from Arichat who gives back to his community by coaching younger people.

"Financial aid is extremely important," he says. "It gives students a fair chance at obtaining an education and fulfilling their dreams of a better future."

With plans to become an apprentice, move up in the field and eventually teach at NSCC, he is grateful to those who support the Robert Sampson Memorial Award.
