Celebrating our Michelin partnership

Nova Scotia Community College's partnership with Michelin is truly a gift that keeps on giving.

"It's our foundation and our future," says Jeff MacLean, outgoing President of Michelin North America (Canada) Inc.

"NSCC has created so much of the talent that has allowed us to compete in the world, but also allowed us to be the top-quality producer in the world."

In what has been a mutually beneficial relationship, the company has been involved in volunteer committees, has taken hundreds of students for work placements, funded the Michelin Technical Scholarship Program, and recently donated \$200,000 to the College's Urgent Aid Fund.

Through that gift, MacLean hopes to open doors for more students, regardless of their challenges. "We want to help people find the opportunity to be everything they want to be and can be," he says.

The scholarship program, which includes a bursary, offers recipients real-world experience in the form of work placements, as well as priority consideration for employment.

But MacLean – who started at Michelin as a co-op engineering student – says it's equally valuable to the company.

"It's a very rich program, and great for attraction and retention. These talented students can focus on learning and help us to shape and adjust our work environment to help attract new talent."

The NSCC – Michelin partnership has grown over the past 20 years and includes:

- Customized training programs delivered by NSCC to Michelin employees: ranging from the Manufacturing Leadership Certificate Program, Overhead Crane Certification, to Conversational French.
- Michelin Technical Scholarship: This sponsor-a-student program includes a bursary, work term and priority consideration for employment. An annual gift of \$48,000 from Michelin helps up to 16 students each year.
- Student work terms: Many NSCC students complete work terms each spring at Michelin's three locations: Granton, Bridgewater and Waterville.
- Program Advisory Committees: Michelin representatives frequently volunteer in this capacity.
- \$200,000 donation by Michelin to NSCC's Urgent Aid Fund province-wide, part of Make Way The Campaign for NSCC.

That's why the company founded the Tekarra Lodge Hospitality Award in 2018, supporting a second-year student in the program each year with a \$1,000 bursary.

"We hope it's beneficial for people in the industry who are interested in what we do, and that it will entice a few more ambassadors our way," says Sophocleous.

Canadians and Australians comprise most of the staff ambassadors – who work in customer service, housekeeping, laundry and maintenance – at the 53-unit lodge, which opened in 1947.

The tranquil setting with its breathtaking mountain views and wildlife visitors has attracted three NSCC students this year: Scott MacQueen, Emily Briand and Rae Doyle.

"I was interested in an older clientele, because I'm older," says Cindy, who graduated from Cosmetology at Annapolis Valley Campus in 2015.

In her mid-50s, she sought out the program after she and her retired husband settled in the area. A New Mexico native, Cindy had been a successful entrepreneur, legal secretary and realtor in British Columbia.

"I always felt that I had missed my opportunity to do hair. At one time, it was hair or real estate, and real estate won," says the mother of three grown children.

After deciding to take the plunge at NSCC, she received the Mark, Jeffrey and Susan Reeves Achievement Award.

"For me to come up with a chunk of money to go to school was a challenge. Taking a full time program leaves one very little time to work in between," she says.

"The bursary gave me a feeling of worth, because I felt my situation was unique. It made me feel like, 'no, I'm not crazy.'"

After time working at a mainstream spa, Cindy now divides her work days between salons located at

Saunders Rest Home in Bridgetown and Heart of the Valley Long-Term Care Centre in Middleton.

"I have very fine hair, and I always wanted to work with people who don't have perfect hair," she says. "Most people who have hair want it to look nice. When they come to see me, it's something that helps them to feel normal and uplifted."
