This past year has been one marked by change, growth and learning. In April 2019, we welcomed Michelle Bussey, as the new Executive Director. Michelle previously served as the Director of Development and started with a mission to lead the Make Way Campaign. As new Executive Director, her mandate was to transform the team and organization to lead post Make Way.

To streamline our development initiatives, we undertook a restructure and as part of this effort, the Foundation team has changed to include a second development officer, two stewardship and donor relations officers, a gift administrator and a communications associate.

Thanks to donors like you, over \$1 million in new donations was received in 2019/2020 and this has allowed us to continue

improving programs and processes to make it easier for students to have access to funding.

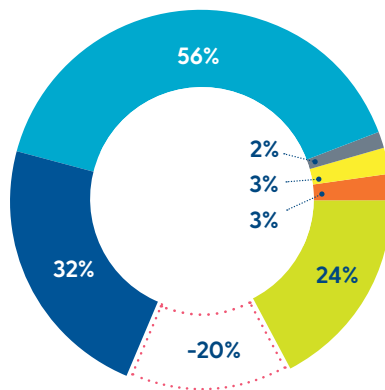

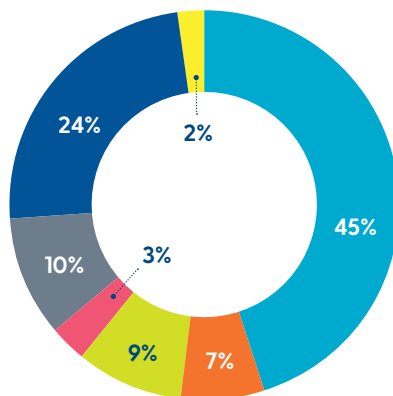

Emergency housing solution built from experience with students in crisis

Lisa Mader says welcoming the first student to NSCC's Metro Emergency Housing Program (MEHP) was an emotional experience for everyone involved.

"Just to see their face as they walked through the furnished apartment we had secured for them, it was clear how much it meant to have a safe place to call home," says Lisa, Student Services Counsellor, IT Campus.

Launched as a pilot in September 2019, the program offers short-term housing, care packages, as well as food and transportation assistance to students at the three metro campuses and eCampus students in the metro area who are experiencing an immediate risk to their personal safety.

"Safe housing is essential for student success and mental wellness," Mader says. "Although we have

great shelters throughout the municipality, none of them are quite geared to meet the needs of post-secondary students who are experiencing anxiety and uncertainty about their living conditions. I wanted to create an NSCC program to fill that gap."

Thanks to financial support from donors, NSCC Foundation and the College, all costs are covered for the program, allowing students a month to plan for long term accommodation.

Fall tour of South Shore businesses for EAL students

On a field trip to Lunenburg, students were able to practice listening and speaking with experts about cranberry farming and production, the effect of climate change on the environment, and the history of fisheries in Nova Scotia.

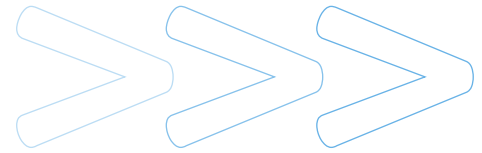
"It was interesting to learn how cranberries grow in Nova Scotia, and how big this trade is here," said student Tommy Cesarano.

The RBC Student Works program helps students like Sara develop skills through professional development and work practice in their field of interest. When Sara came to NSCC, her goal was to be comfortable doing uncomfortable things. She has been able to achieve that with more presentations, campus involvement, networking and leadership roles which now include her work as a peer tutor.

“The program has solidified my sense of belonging in the helping profession.” Sara says **“Overall, I think the greatest thing I have taken away from this program is confidence: confidence in my professional abilities; confidence in my personal value; confidence being in unfamiliar situations and confidence in the direction my life. Do I know exactly what direction in social services I want to take? No, but I am confident that my time at NSCC will lead the way.”**

Physician's Philanthropic Fund to support new student awards

The Physicians' Philanthropic Fund was created by a group of physicians and community members at the Valley Regional Hospital who are passionate about giving back to the community.

Every two years the Physicians' Philanthropic Fund group hosts a fundraising gala, with the most recent event taking place in October 2019 at the Wolfville Farmers' Market. A portion of the proceeds raised that evening have been donated to support students at NSCC. **The physicians' donated \$8,100** of the

proceeds from the event to support awards for students studying in non-traditional programs at Kingstec Campus.

For their October 2019 gala, three NSCC students studying in the Baking and Pastry Arts program at Kingstec Campus provided themed cakes for auctioning and desserts for the dinner that evening.

Since 1998, the Physicians Philanthropic Fund has raised over \$268,000 to support Annapolis Valley charities and organizations.

Careers at Sea program to bolster marine industry



With the steady growth of the marine industry across Canada, NSCC has become the go-to learning centre for qualified candidates to fill the gaps within the industry for years to come. The 2019-2020 Careers at Sea campaign highlighted the Nautical Institute's programs offered at NSCC Strait Area Campus as well as training programs across the province.

Thanks to funding from Transport Canada, through the A'paqt Careers at Sea program, over \$2.5 million in bursaries is available for women and Indigenous peoples to pursue nautical training.

Throughout the first year, the project removed barriers for these underrepresented groups, and **over 140 students like Tiffany O'Donnell successfully enrolled.** As part of the program, students are eligible for awards that cover up to 90% of tuition fees and, in some cases, living expenses while they pursue their studies.

In 2019, Tiffany O'Donnell was a first-year Marine Engineering student onboard the Algoma Harvester, which is a Bulk Carrier that sails the Great Lakes.

This was part of Tiffany's first 90-day phase through NSCC Nautical Institute.

"I'm learning 100 new things a day and loving every minute of it. Every day I'm thankful for such an amazing opportunity to be pursuing my dream as a Marine Engineer. This has all been made possible through the A'paqt Careers at Sea program." Tiffany says.

"As a 27-year-old with a 9-5 office job, it was a scary decision leaving full-time employment to go back to school to learn something totally out of my comfort zone. The program eased a lot of financial stress and they've been nothing short of supportive with monthly get-togethers and frequent check-ins to see how things are going. From the moment I began my program I've felt a strong sense of community at the Nautical Institute."
