Matt Currie: From award recipient to staff donor

When Matt Currie joined NSCC in 2013, he saw an opportunity to put his experience in finance and public relations to work for his alma mater in the Student Awards and Experience Office (SAEO).

As an NSCC Public Relations student in 2007, Matt received an award — an experience that he says gave him

a boost and made him feel like someone invested in him. Someone cared about him and the journey he was on. “I wanted to play that role in someone else’s life.”

A lot has changed in 7 years. When Matt started at the SAEO, on average, 1 in 7 seven applicants received funding. Now, thanks to the Make Way Campaign and the generosity of donors, 1 in 4 applicants receive an award.

However, the need is still great, as 75% of those that apply do not receive funding.

The biggest challenge continues to be the barrier faced by students when they return to school to change career paths. In working with these students, Matt says it is clear to see that great sacrifices have been made. In many cases, they had to give up a full-time job, sell their property, or relocate their lives to come to college. Some have dependents and over and above the tuition fees, they have day-to-day living expenses to worry about.

Receiving this support is often the make-or-break in whether they will succeed.

Matt has been an NSCC staff donor for the last five years. “Every day I have the privilege of witnessing the impact that awards and scholarships have on our students and I wanted to contribute to that impact.” His motivation is clear. **“If I can help alleviate any bit of pressure a student can have so they can worry a little bit less about their finances and focus a little bit more on their program, then that is a win for me.”**

As Manager, Student Awards and Financial Aid, Matt continues to advocate for students and to encourage more staff to support. “I feel like I won the lottery with this job. I get to make an impact on students every day. I am blessed to be able to do this work to help make education a reality for some that may not have been able to pursue that.”

20for20 – A celebration of perseverance and community

In June, 20 African Nova Scotians successfully graduated from their Welding program at NSCC. The students made up the first Irving Pathways to Shipbuilding cohort for African Nova Scotians. The two-year program is part of an innovative approach linking education and industry while creating intentional opportunities for equity-seeking groups.

The program has resulted in unprecedented success. The students – now dubbed the **20for20**, all came from different backgrounds, and many were going through a career transition with little or no experience in trades. **What they had in common was a determination to succeed.** The selection process was intense, the program was physically and mentally demanding and COVID-19 challenged them to learn in a new way. No matter what obstacles got in their way, they stayed focused and pushed each other to get to the finish line.

Sattina Dabb, a mother of three, was one of only four women in the program. When she joined the class,

it felt intimidating, but she quickly learned that she was now part of a team that was committed to learning and supporting each other. “The best part of the program was the community that we built as a class. **We all worked together; if someone was struggling, there was always someone you could go to that was ready to help.**”

Through the program, students gained practical skills in a range of disciplines from metal fabrication and welding, to mathematics.

Sattina says joining the program was the best decision she’s ever made. “I took a chance and it worked out. I am doing something I enjoy. I can be a role model to my children, especially my daughter. I am showing them that it is possible to juggle family life with going back to school at this age and still working part time to provide for my family—that is something I can be proud of.”
